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# FOREWORD

**W**e take pleasure in presenting the report for the period 2022-2023. The report will take you through our activities, the impact created, the challenges faced and our success stories. Protecting and promoting child rights has been the focus and the different activities with children and stakeholders were geared towards empowering the community to uphold child rights.

As an aftermath of Covid-19 school lockdown and the disruption in school education, an escalation in the number of Out of school children (OOSC) was observed. Emphasis was laid on enrolment of children and sustaining children in school. The emerging child protection issues of substance abuse, online addiction and behaviour problems were addressed.

The strategic plan for the five years period 2022-2027 was held with the participation of community members and the road map for the next five years has been chalked out. The external evaluation of the project 'Adolescent Awareness and Capacity Building' supported by Azim Premji Foundation provided positive feedback and constructive recommendations for way forward.

A new computer training centre was started at Korukkupet with the support of Asmae, France. This provides training in Diploma in Computer Application, Tally, spoken English and life skill and prepare for job placement.

E. Mala one of our earlier children sangam member who journeyed with Arunodhaya in the youth forum and as team member received Pudhumai Penn award from Chennai District collector.

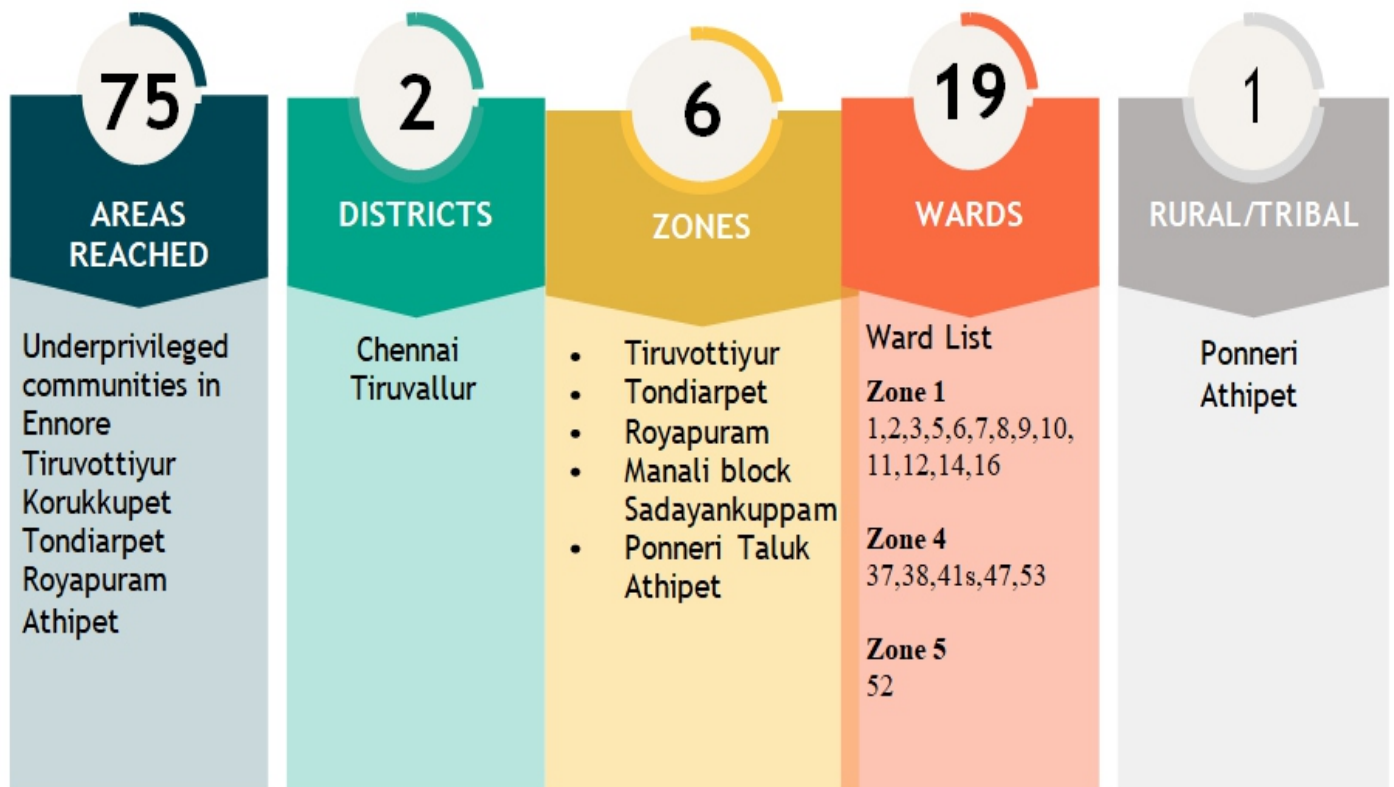

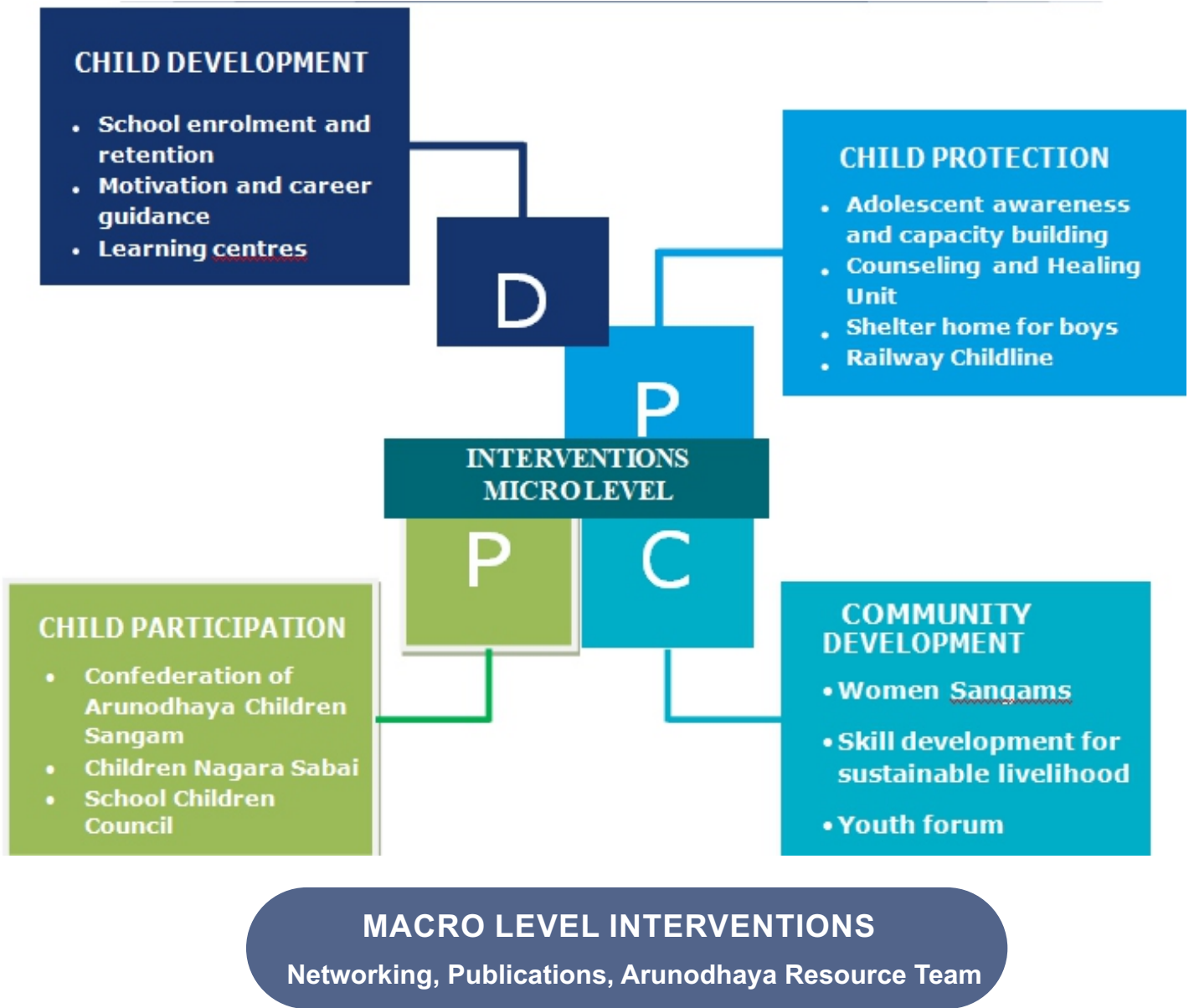

# EDUCATION

**Strategic objective : Create opportunities for all children to fully develop physically, mentally, gain knowledge and develop their personality.**

## EDUCATION

Arunodhaya strongly believes that education is the foundation for development. The interventions aim at sustaining children in schools and motivation and guidance for higher studies and career.

#### 1. IDENTIFICATION OF OUT OF SCHOOL CHILDREN THROUGH SCHOOL VISITS AND AREA VISIT

Arunodhaya team visits 24 schools in the intervention areas and collect information on long absentees. These children are visited and brought back to school. Out of school children are also identified through area visits.



81 Out of school children enrolled in schools. 3 children enrolled in ITI

#### Back to school

Deepa, 14 yrs (name changed) was studying in 6th std. During the Covid-19 first lock down her mother deserted the family. Her father works as a plumber. He stopped Deepa from school to take care of the house and her two younger sisters. During the time of area visit and Ilanthalir (Adolescent) group formation Arunodhaya team found the girl not going to school. Through regular visit and rapport with the child she was motivated to continue her education and she asked the team to enroll her in school. After that the team gave counseling to the father and he agreed to send her to school.

Arunodhaya team enrolled the child at Government Higher Secondary school, Patel Nagar, Tondiarpet. In government school every child gets one set uniform, after explaining the child's situation the school provided two sets of school uniform. Now she is studying in 8th standard and enjoying her childhood with her friends.

## 2. LEARNING CENTRES

Learning centres were organised to monitor the education of children in vulnerable families such as single women, dysfunctional families and children were assisted in their studies.

## 3. STEP TO SUCCESS - MOTIVATION SESSIONS FOR CHILDREN APPEARING FOR PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS

Step to Success- is the motivation session for children preparing for board exams. School teachers and motivation speakers are invited to provide guidance on overcoming exam fear, tips on preparing for exam and time management at the exam hall.

## 4. AMAIPPOM ETHIRKALAM - CAREER GUIDANCE SESSION

*Amaippom Ethirkalam* provides guidance to students on selection of career and preparing for it. It was held on 19th April 2022 at Government Higher Secondary School, Kathivakkam, Chennai. 80 students studying in 12th std. participated in the session. The trainer provided them with information on the career options available with reference to the groups taken by them and advised them on the courses that they can pursue for higher education.



## 5. ENHANCING KNOWLEDGE

Opportunities were provided to children to enhance their knowledge in spoken English, computer skills, reading and writing skills and general awareness.

### 5.1. Spoken English Classes

Spoken English classes were conducted to develop English language skill among children. This was an online course conducted in collaboration with Passion guru. The classes were held once a week from April 2022 to December 2022. 45 school children (21 boys and 24 girls) and 18 college students (11 girls and 7 boys) participated in the programme.

### 5.2. Computer Skill

During summer vacation a short-term computer course was organised for students at Arunodhaya computer centre. 50 students participated and enhanced their knowledge in computer application.

### 5.3. Reading Skill

Libraries are organised at the field office in Ennore and Korukkupet. Books related to their subjects, story books, motivational books, general knowledge, books on animals, birds etc. are maintained at the library. 100 children regularly used the library.

### 5.4. General Awareness

To have an exposure and develop general knowledge children were taken on visit to Anna zoological park, Planetarium and Rail Museum. Children were happy to see the animals, learn about planet and gain information on the railway system. They shared their experience with other children in their school.



## 6. JOINT ACTIONS WITH SCHOOLS

Arunodhaya team trained children in parai, puppet show, street play, dance and drawing for participation in Kalai vizha. Children were also supported for participation in the science exhibition.



Evening snacks was provided for 10th std students in Chennai High School, Kodugaiyur during the special class held in preparation for board exams. It was given to 240 children for 10 days. This helped them to be energetic during the special classes and prepare well for the exams.

Education materials were distributed to 110 children (50 boys and 60 girls)

Arunodhaya is a member of the District Advisory Team of Illam Thedi Kalvi scheme (ITK). Arunodhaya referred 23 women as volunteers for the ITK and visited the centres.





# CHILD PROTECTION

**Strategic objective: Create a protective environment for every child to be free from all forms of violence, exploitation and neglect.**

## CHILD PROTECTION

Right to protection is one of the basic principles of UNCRC. Every child irrespective of colour, creed, nationality has the rights to be protected from all forms of violence, neglect and denial of rights.

#### 1. AWARENESS AND CAPACITY BUILDING OF ADOLESCENTS

Adolescents face a myriad of problems which arise from lack of awareness and capacity. Programmes were organised to create awareness and build the capacity of adolescents to enable them to protect themselves from exploitative and abusive situation. The following activities were organised

- Ilanthalir (adolescents) sessions
- Awareness campaign in schools
- Awareness on menstrual hygiene & reproductive health
- Life skill development
- Interface & exposure

##### 1.1. Ilanthalir (Adolescents) Sessions

Ilanthalir groups were formed with adolescents in the age group 12- 18 years. Monthly sessions were organised for the Ilanthalir members on the following topics

- Introduction about the organization
- Adolescent stages
- Roles and responsibilities of adolescents
- Understanding gender
- Sex education
- Reproductive system & its functions
- Love and infatuation
- Sexual abuse
- Child marriage
- Drugs and substance abuse
- Online safety
- Evaluation

In the month of June 2022, 1692 adolescents (810 boys 882 girls) completed the Ilanthalir



An evaluation was conducted to assess the learning of the members. The findings are given below.

- 99% said that they have an understanding on adolescent stages, the changes that take place, gender rights and on the aspects of POCSO act and Prohibition of Child marriage act.
- 82% revealed that they have gained information on puberty and sexuality.
- 79% said that they can now differentiate between love and infatuation
- 61% shared the information they received in llanthalir sessions with their friends.

“In the media we hear about sexual abuse but was not aware of the solution to this problem. Through the llanthalir session gained information on POCSO act and its reporting mechanism. Also came to know about the negative impact of child marriage”.

“The llanthalir session created an awareness on gender equality. It made me realise that everyone is born equal. Both boys and girls have same rights. I will treat my siblings equally”.

“Covid-19 put smart phones in our hands and we adolescents got addicted to certain apps. This has created unnecessary problems. Now, we know that we can report online abuse to Arunodhaya team members and we also got information on the reporting option on the Apps which we could use in case of online abuse”.



## 1.2. Awareness Campaign in Schools

Awareness campaign was organised in Primary schools and in Middle and High schools.

### 1.2.1. Awareness campaign in primary schools

Awareness to protect themselves from sexual abuse was conducted in seven primary schools reaching out to 708 children (360 boys and 348 girls). The children were made aware of safe and unsafe touch and how to respond if they are sexually abused.



Teachers shared that they were feeling hesitant to speak about child sexual abuse, safe and unsafe touch with children. “The session conducted by Arunodhaya with the children, has built confidence in us of speaking with children on this issue as well as on ways of preventing child sexual abuse”.

Mothers shared that their children spoke to them about the information provided by Arunodhaya team on safe and unsafe touch. “We are happy that our children have developed the confidence to protect themselves from sexually abusive situation”.



### 1.2.2. Awareness in middle and high school

Awareness on adolescent issues was organised in 15 schools reaching out to 1059 adolescents (523 boys and 36 girls) studying in 8th and 9th std. The students were oriented on the following topics

- Adolescent stages
- Roles and responsibilities of adolescents
- Child marriage
- Reproductive system
- Love and infatuation
- Goal setting
- Emotional and stress management

Ms. Charlotte Cotton and Mr. Vincent Chiu volunteers from PROPOLIS, France conducted session on sexuality and its taboos for students in Chennai higher secondary school, Patel Nagar on 9th February 2023 and for boys on 12th February 2023.



## LEARNING

‘In science class the teachers will omit the part of reproductive system. Through this awareness programme I have understood the functions of reproductive organ and its importance.’

‘In this adolescent age we get into many distractions and also, we are quickly triggered to get angry. Through this programme I understood how to handle my emotions and stress.’

‘After the session came to know about the difference between love and infatuation. This is the right time to set our goal and need to be focused on our goal until we achieve it.’

### 1.3. Awareness on Menstrual Hygiene and Reproductive Health

This programme was organised in collaboration with Eco femme. The objective of the session is to explode myths around menstruation, make the adolescents aware of menstrual cycle, remove fear and inhibitions associated with menstruation, inform them on hygienic practices, make them aware of the different menstrual products with their positive and negative aspects. 960 adolescents were reached through 15 schools and one Childcare institution. Cloth pads were distributed at the end of the session.



### 1.4. Life Skill Development

Life skill training focused on developing the skills of children in setting goals in life, effective communication, building relationships, emotional and stress management and time management.

Two residential trainings were organised each of two days duration. 77 adolescents participated in the training.

### 1.5. Interface & Exposure Visits

Interface and exposure visits were organised to widen the understanding of adolescents on legislation and protection mechanisms.

## ADOLESCENT CONSULTATION

Consultation was organised by adolescent group on the theme “Challenges faced by adolescents and Role of Society” on 26th June 2022. The Consultation focused on the challenges faced by adolescents like bullying, online addiction, drug and substance abuse, child marriage, sexual abuse, child labour, coping with education and depression and the role of community members and existing mechanism to support and help them to overcome the challenges. The adolescents presented through exhibition and cultural events the challenges faced by them and their expectations from the society.

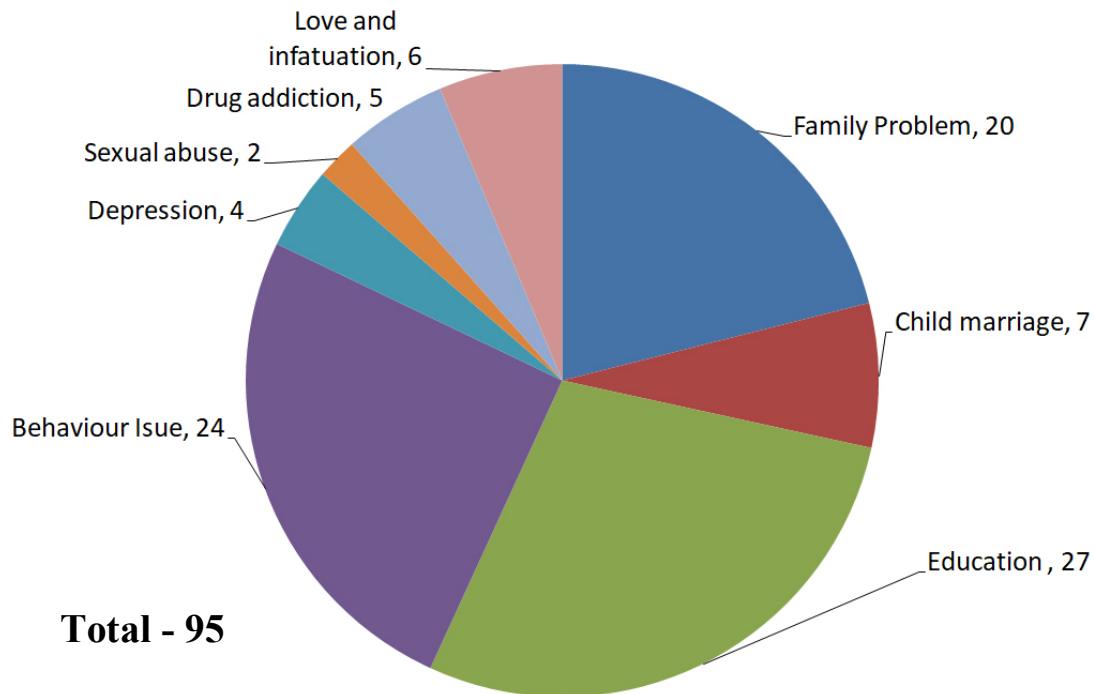


## 2. COUNSELING AND HEALING UNIT (CHU)

Counselling and Healing Unit provides counselling to affected adolescents and guides in accessing legal, medical and educational support where needed. Clients are identified during Ilanthalir session, school campaign and home visits. Clients are also referred by school teachers, adult peereducators, adolescents and women group members. Individual and Group counselling is conducted.

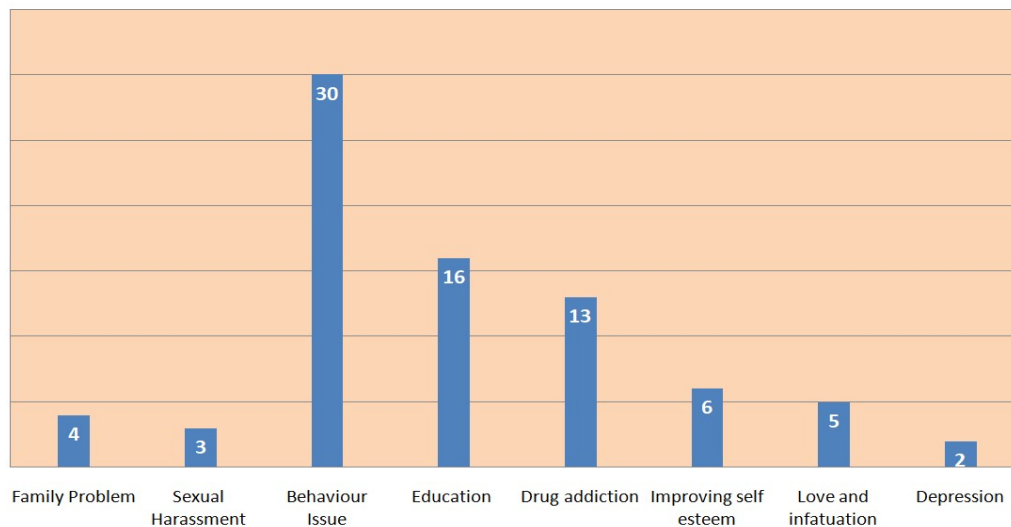
Individual Counselling was provided to 95 adolescents. Behaviour issues, education, family problem, child marriage, love and infatuation, drug addiction, depression and sexual abuse were the issues handled in counselling.

Group counselling was conducted in places where certain issues were reported to be high. Counselling was provided to 79 adolescents to address issues related to family problems, sexualharassment, behaviour issue, education, drug addiction, improving self-esteem, love and infatuation, depression and 3 parents were counselled on parenting skills.

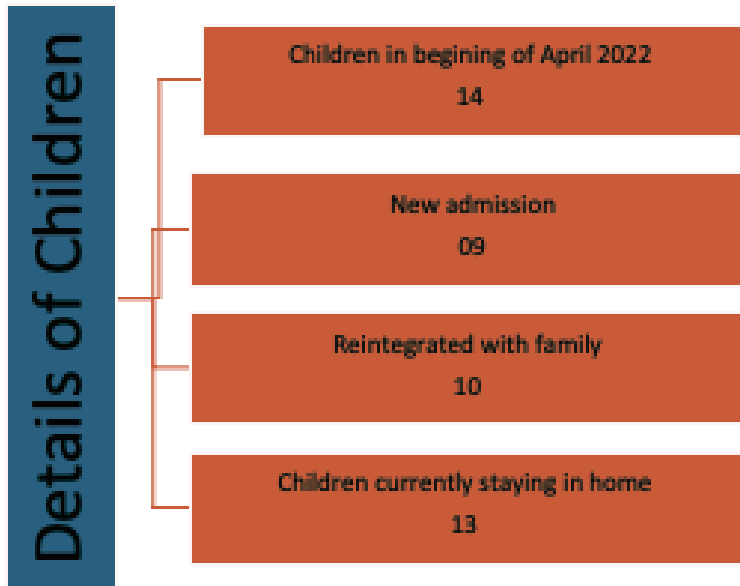
**Figure 2 Group counselling**



### 3. SHELTER HOME

The Shelter home for boys located at R.R.nagar, Kodungaiyur (opposite to Dumping yard) reaches out to children working in the dumping yard, children on the street, children from dysfunctional families and children in difficult circumstances. The shelter provides shelter, food and clothing. All the children are enrolled in school and counselling is provided to reintegrate them with their families or rehabilitate in Child care institutions.

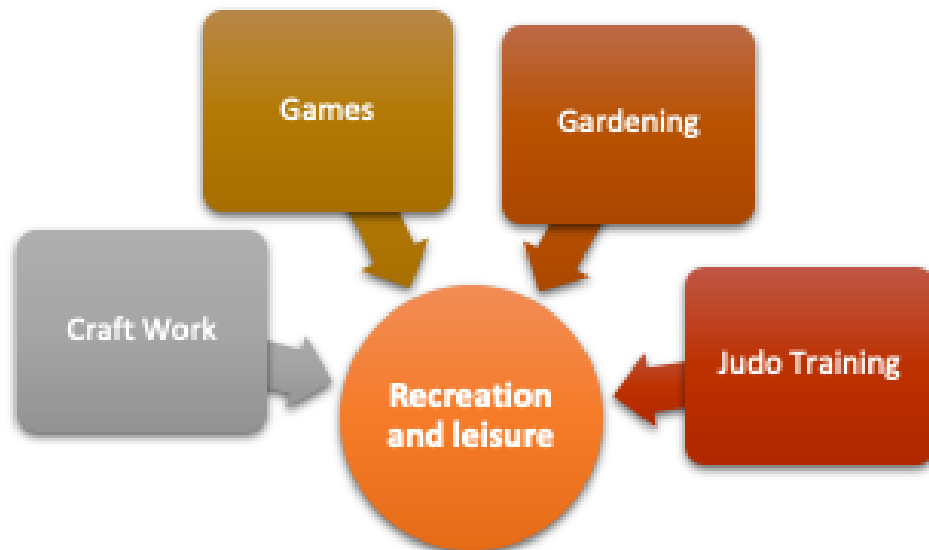

## CHILDREN'S PARTICIPTION IN SHELTER MANAGEMENT

Children's Coordination Committee is formed with the participation of children to ensure their participation rights. Four committees have been formed.

The committees meet once in a fortnight and discuss on the issues concerning the above aspects. Children prepare the food menu, take responsibility of keeping the place clean, maintain discipline and plan the education, sports and cultural activities. The daily schedule is worked in consultation with the children. This makes them feel that this is their home and take the responsibility.

Children evaluated the shelter environment, food, education, health and hygiene, recreational activities and trainings organised in last year. They also prepared plan for this year. Children in primary level drew 'the shelter they would imagine in this year and explained. This year children said that they need bench in park area, sports kits, bunker beds, separate cupboards and separate room for younger children.

## ADMINISTRATION/MANAGEMENT

### Shelter Monitoring Committee

Shelter Monitoring Committee meetings are held once in a month. During the reporting period nine meetings were conducted. Representatives from the zonal office, health department, police, representative from SUH- GCC, community members, staff team and children are the part of the SMC. Issues related to the functioning of the shelter were discussed. Important issues discussed were the drainage problem, drinking water supply, replacing play items in the park and finding a new and better place for the shelter. Issues related to the drainage and water supply was resolved. But the major issue of relocating the shelter to a better place remain unresolved.



The shelter home is only a transit home providing short term care aiming at reintegration / rehabilitation. Through the process of counselling provided to children, rapport with the family and family counselling 12 children were reintegrated with their families.

## FOLLOW UP

Follow up is done on children who were reintegrated or rehabilitated. A meeting was organized for these children. Children were happy to share about their developments. They have become a role model for the present children, sharing with them the change that they have gone through. Some of them come back to the shelter and interact with the children. They also join in the different celebrations.

## SPONSORS

During this reporting period 99 sponsors sponsored food, snacks, dresses, stationary kits, crackers, provisions, school bags, toiletry items, games, washing machine etc. We thank all the sponsors those who take part in ensuring basic right of the underprivileged children.



### To be in Right Track- Dropout to Student

Name: Suresh ( name changes) Age: 8 years

Education: 4th Standard

Suresh is from Royapuram. His parents divorced, when he was five years old. His mother got second marriage and his father is addicted to alcohol. Both of them were not bothered about him and did not take care of him. He was living with his grandmother. She is a domestic worker, used to go to work early in the morning. The child was not going to school regularly, he was dropout because no one at home to take care of him. He used to roam in the street. Whenever grandmother asked him to go to school, he used to scold her with bad words. Grandmother worried about his future and she is only bread winner for the family so not able to leave her job, at the same time she wants to save him from bad habits.

During the area visit, Grandmother told about her situation and asked the staff to enroll him to shelter home. He was enrolled in Shelter home on 14.03.2022. Suresh was mentally disturbed due to his parent's behaviour, no confidence, short tempered, and used bad language. He was regularly counseled to come out from his past life, develop self-confidence, and to identify his individual talents. He was enrolled in 4th standard. Now he is going to school regularly.

Suresh told his ambition is to become a Police. After regular counseling, he came out from his pathetic situation. Now he is actively participating in various activities like drawing, painting, singing and dance. His confidence level increased and not using any bad words. He is very friendly with other and teaching them to keep the shelter clean.



## 4. RAILWAY CHILDLINE

“My son (12) had runaway from home for sightseeing. I am a painter, I don't want my child to struggle like me in his life. So I did everything that made him happy. But he does not listen to me, not going to school regularly and wandering with his friends in the area. One day he went missing and I was very much pained. But luckily I received a call from Childline saying that my child is received by Childline. The counselors advised my son as well as counseled me on how to bring up my child. I am happy to say that he is behaving well and going to school regularly. Thanks to RCL for saving my child”.

Child help desk (CHD) at Egmore railway station rescued 129 children (99 boys and 30 girls). They were rescued from the station premises with the support of GRP, RPF, Railway officials, Sahayaks, Cleaning staff, Auto and Taxi drivers and passengers. CHD team members are present at the station 24\*7 visiting the station premises and trains to identify children in need of care and protection. The rescued children were received at the Child help desk and provided food and refreshments. Information was obtained from them about their situation and their need is assessed. Memo is obtained from GRP and the child was produced before the Child Welfare Committee for rehabilitation/reintegration. 75% of the children were reunited with their families and 25% of children were placed at Child care institutions

### 4.1. Sensitization and Awareness programmes

Sensitization programmes through individual contact, group meetings were held for RPF, TTE, TTR, Krystal staff, SSE workers, Sahayaks, Prepaid Auto and Taxi drivers, Carrier and Wagon staff, and Shop owners. Seventy programmes were conducted creating awareness on identifying children in need of care and protection, role of different stakeholders, childline functioning. These programmes helped in building a rapport with the stakeholders, developing an understanding on childline and enlisting their support and cooperation in the rescue of children. They also extended their support during mass awareness campaigns.

Mass awareness programmes were conducted on special days such as Anti child labour day (30th April), International day against child labour (12th June), International day against child trafficking (30th July), Childline se dosti week (14th November-20th November). These programmes were organised in collaboration with Railway officials, GRP and RPF. Street play, signature campaign, rally, oath taking, Raksha bandhan were organised to create awareness among the passengers on their role in identifying and rescuing children in need of care and protection during their travel in the train or in the railway station premises. They were informed on the activities of childline and child help desk at the station premises.



## 4.2. Child Help Group Meeting

Child help group meeting was held every month convened by the Station director. Railway officials and representatives from GRP, RPF, Apollo clinic, Krystal team participated in the meeting along with CHDK representatives. Convening the Child help group meeting proved to be a good practice. This enabled in building a rapport between childline, primary and secondary stakeholders in the station premises and mobilising their support and cooperation in the protection of children in need of care and protection. The decisions taken at the Child help group meeting facilitated the conduct of training, awareness programmes, train visit and coordinated action between the different primary stakeholders.

## 4.3. Open house

Open house was conducted in Dr. Ambedkar government higher secondary school in Egmore. Five sessions were organised on substance abuse and online addiction. Through games, exercises and videos children were led to understand the impact of substance abuse and drug addiction and guided on protecting themselves from these addictions.

### Freed from child labour

Karthik, Jai (Name changed) 17 years old were rescued by Child help desk members from 5th platform. The children were about to board Kachiguda express to travel to Andhra to work in a bakery. The children are from Tiruvarur and had studied upto 11th std. They were sent by their parents to work in Andhra.



After receiving the memo the children were produced before CWC and the parents were informed. The parents came to Egmore station the next day. They were counselled on the impact of child labour and the importance of educating the children. They were also advised to obtain support from the District child protection unit or NGOs in their district. They agreed to educate their children. Through CWC the children were united with their parents. In follow up it is found that both the children have been enrolled in ITI Diploma course in Mechanical engineering and the children expressed happiness in continuing their studies.

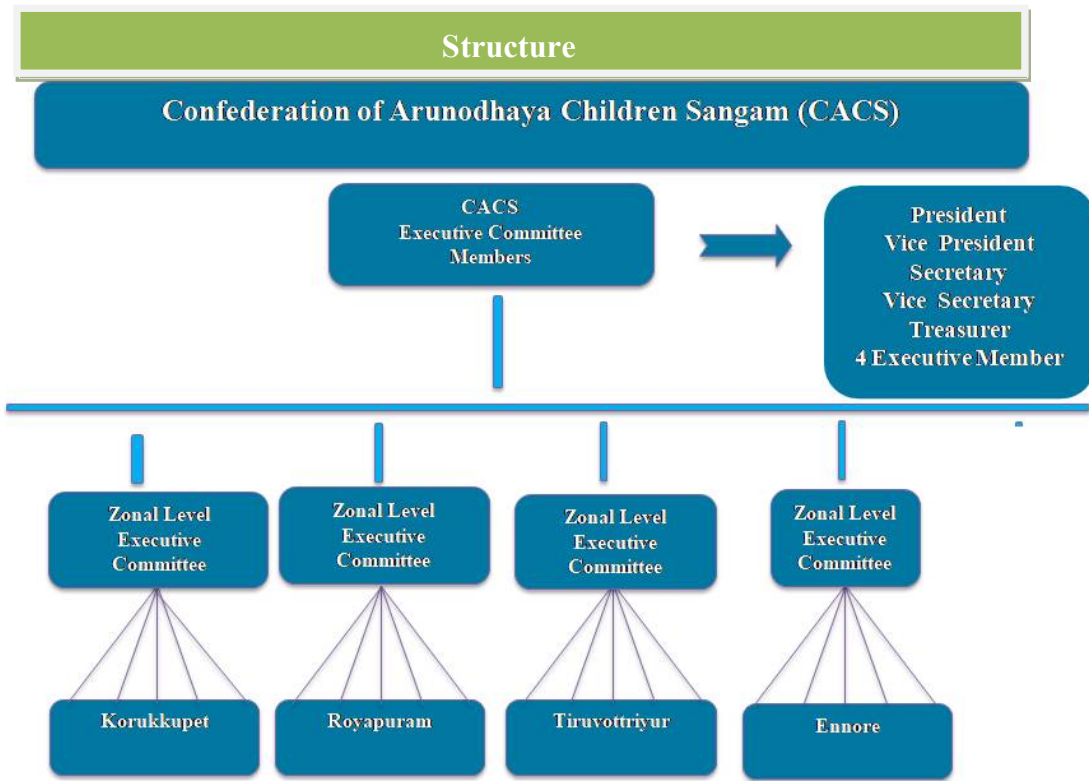

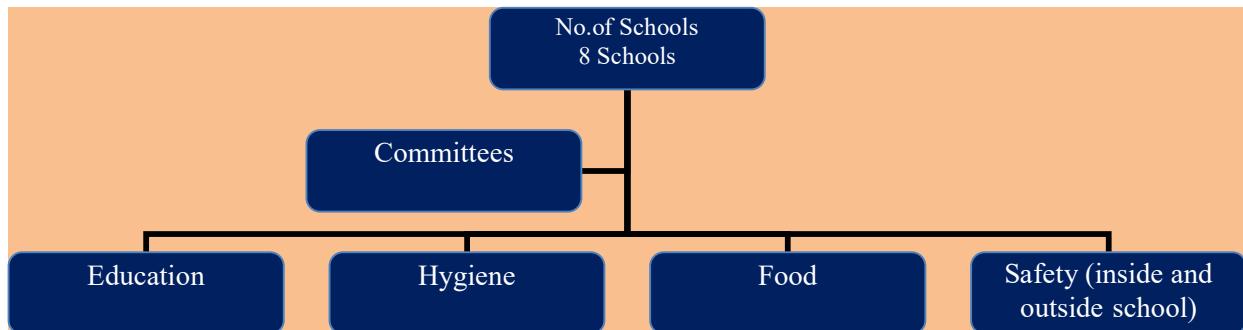

## 2. LEARNING AND EXPERIENCING DEMOCRATIC ELECTIONS

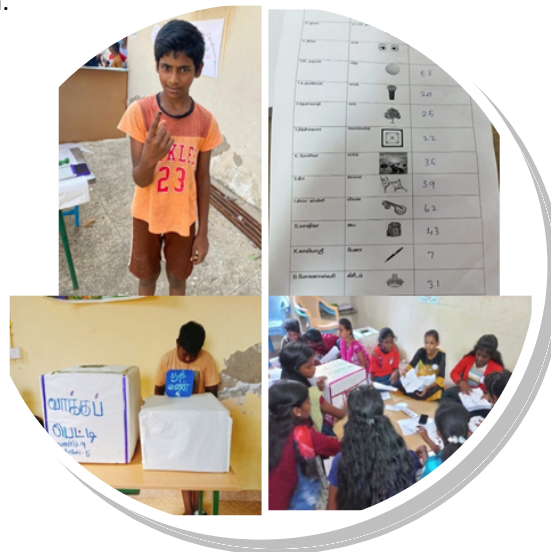
The leaders of the different child led organisations are elected through a process of democratic election. Area level and zonal level elections were held through voting. At the confederation level an election commission was formed with the children, nominations were called for and voting was held on 8th September 2022.

Children nagara sabai elections were held in 10 wards on 31st July 2022.



**CACS Executive Committee**

In the CACS network election and Children nagara sabai election, children had a hand on experience on conducting election. Election commission was formed with the children and they took the responsibility of preparing the electoral list, calling for nomination, allotting symbols, setting dates for election process, monitoring campaign, preparing the ballot sheet, setting election booth, counting the ballot papers and announcing the winners. It was a great experience for the election commission members and children who participated in the election.



### 3. CAPACITY BUILDING

Training programmes were organised to develop the capacity of children in identifying issues, gaining information, forming opinion, engaging with adults and develop skills in expressing themselves through various means.

### 4. ENGAGING WITH ADULTS

Space and opportunities are created for the child led organisations to engage with adults, voice their opinion, present their demands and enlist their response.

#### 4.1. Interacting with Ward councilars and officials through Children nagara sabai

Children nagara sabai is the space where children interact with the Ward Councilors, local leaders, teachers, police and other stakeholders. They present their demands.

Election of child councilors was held on 31/7 2022. In the first week of August investiture ceremony with oath taking by child councilors was held at zonal level.

#### Mr. U. Ganesen, 38th ward Counsellor and Chairman

Mr. U Ganesan, the City Council Chairman, congratulated the children for democratically conducting the elections. He also congratulated the elected representatives and motivated them to do their best along with the support of the counsellors and staff.

Children nagara sabai has been formed in the following Wards with ten child councilors in each ward.

## 4.2. Interaction with State Education Policy Committee members

Tamilnadu government constituted a Committee to draft the State education policy. Children were informed of the National Education Policy and about the formation of the State education policy committee. Zonal level meetings were held in the month of September and consolidated their demands at the Confederation level meetings held on 24th September 2022. Children developed their demands and presented to the State Education Policy at the interaction held at Korukkupet field office on 3rd October 2022. Four members of the committee Mr. Sultan Ahmed Ismail, Mr. R. Srinivasan, Ms. Aruna Rathinam and Ms. Jayashree participated and listened to the children views and noted it for inclusion in their recommendations.



Children were introduced to the Universal Periodic Review Process-4 so that they gain knowledge and information on how children issues are discussed at the UN level. They also came to know of the presentation by the government on the status of children in India, and the commitment made by the government in response to the recommendations. Along with FCMRP they received training on UPR and were part of the process of preparing children report for UPR-4

## 4.3. World Children's day

World Children's day was celebrated on the theme 'Violence Free Society and Happy World for Children'. In the morning games such as snake and ladder, boxes, ring ball, frisbee etc. were held. Through these games children conveyed message on child rights and how to protect themselves from violent situations. In the afternoon cultural programmes were held in which through dance, songs, drama, debate children expressed their views on a Happy World for children. During the celebration Selvi S.Sandhya, captain, Team India, who played in the Street children Football World cup match was felicitated.



## 4.4. Networking

Children were provided with opportunities to interact with other children groups at State, national and south Asian level. CACS members have representation in Federation of Children Movement for Right to Participation (FCMRP). Two CACS members Selvan S. Santhosh and Kaaviya are the members of the Executive Committee and Santhosh was elected as Vice secretary in the FCMRP election. A National Children's Consultation was held on 24th and 25th November 2022 at Bhubaneswar, Odisha on the theme of preventing sexual violence among young children. 62 children from 12 states participated in the Consultation. Selvi Haripriya and Selvan Jeeva represented CACS. On the final day of the Consultation stakeholders meeting was held. Jeeva had the opportunity to present the demands on behalf of Tamilnadu.

SAIEVAC online consultation on Child labour was held on 15th December 2022. This consultation was held at South Asian level. Selvan Jeeva participated. Jeeva presented about the child labour issues and how at CACS they are addressing it.

CACS representatives participated in the State level knowledge sharing workshop on empowering the next generation- Youth leadership in building climate resilience and reducing carbon foot print. It was organised by Children believe partners on 25th February 2023 in Chennai. The children gained new knowledge on climate change. They also shared about their experience in preventing use of plastics. As a follow up of this it was decided to have an exposure visit to the mini forest developed by children group of IRCDS, Tiruvallur.



#### 4.5. Media advocacy

Children presented to media their view points on issues concerning them with journalists from TOI and Dinathanthi. They presented their view points on education, what kind of school they like and what kind of education. What are their needs in the area they live in.

### 5. DEVELOPING TALENTS

Frisbee game, Silambam training were organised. Silambam team participated in Chennai level competition held on 27th November 2022 and won medals. The teacher won best teacher award.

Video documentary training was organized to develop skills in producing video and using social media in a positive and constructive way.

### 6. CAMPAIGNS ON CHILD RIGHTS

Children organised programmes at zonal level to commemorate special days

Children drew the plan at zonal level and organised programmes such as rally, human chain, streetplay. ##### 1.1. Self-Help Groups and Income Generation Activities

Self-help groups have been formed into federation and linked with National Urban Literacy Mission (NULM). They received trainings, referred for credit linkages and avail of employment opportunities. 10 groups received credit of Rs. 30,00,000/- Internal loan was taken and income generation activities initiated by SHG groups. Three groups received revolving fund. Women's day programmes were held in the month of March. The SHG federation took the responsibility of organising the programme.

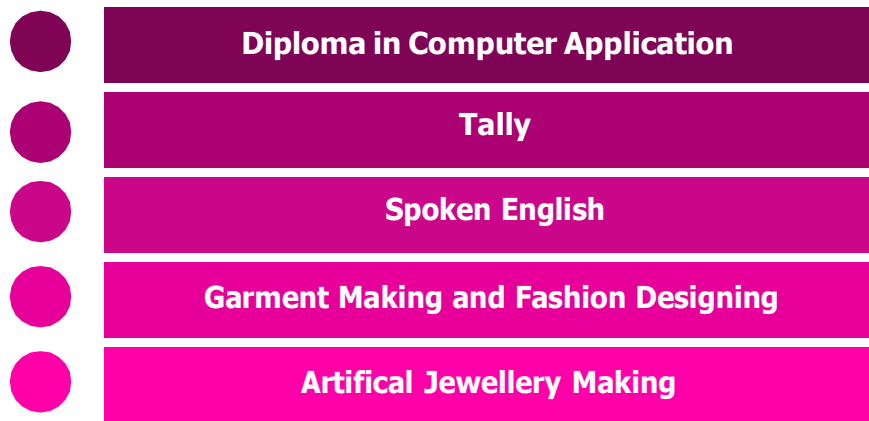

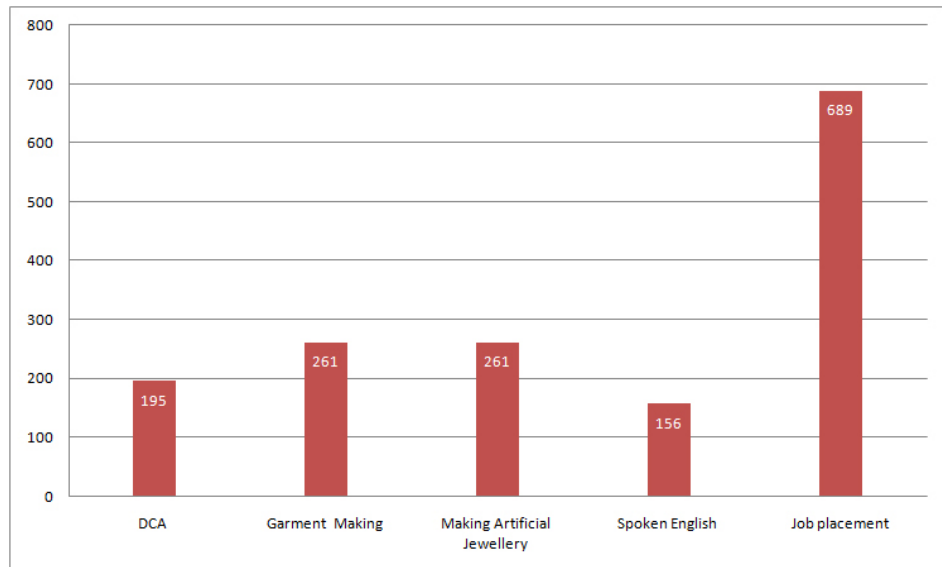

42 companies have been contacted.

19 women were referred for driving course through Tamil Nādu Urban Habitat Development Board



Sandhya from Chinnakuppam has been placed in a garment unit in Redhills. She is earning a salary of Rs. 11,000/- She thanks Arunodhaya and DP World for providing the training which has helped her in getting the job. Her husband is a fisherman and the income was very meagre. “She feels happy that she is able to take care of her children with her income”.

Mohanapriya, Female, (20 yrs.) is a B.com graduate. From being a dejected a helpless girl the DCA course has transformed her into a confident and positive girl. She is now happily employed with Mohan Ads, Nandanam as Accounts trainee on a salary of Rs. 12,000/- p.m. She says’ this training is the turning point in my life. Though I completed B.Com, I could not find a job as I had no knowledge of computer and Tally. Through this course I developed the skill and now I have found a job. I hope to move further in my life’.



### 1.3. Relief and Rehabilitation

During the heavy rains in December some of the areas were flooded. Due to the training provided to the community volunteers on disaster preparedness, arrangements were made for shifting to safer places, organised for distribution of food and relief in collaboration with the Chennai corporation officials. Arunodhaya provided relief materials to the most affected.



### 1.4. Health Camp and Health Awareness

Health awareness sessions were conducted in women groups to make them aware of health and hygiene and protect themselves from diseases. Health camps were organised when needed.



## 1.5. Instilling the Joy of Giving

Joy of Giving week celebrated throughout the country (2nd to 8th October) is taken as an occasion to imbibe the habit of sharing and reaching out to others. Women, children and youth celebrate the Joy of giving by identifying the neediest in their community and tried to bring joy in their life. Aged couples were taken for a movie and provided with sumptuous meal. They enjoyed the day and felt very happy.

The team in Tiruvottiyur visited an old age home and provided food to them. Children sat and spoke with the residents. It was a very meaningful moment for both the senior citizens and the children. The children said that they will take care of the old people in their homes, will respect them and spend time with them. Royapuram team provided rice and provision to the shelter home and spent time with the children.



## 2. STAKEHOLDERS TRAINING

Trainings were organised for the stakeholders to provide information on child protection, empower them with skill to address issues of violence, adolescent stages, sexual abuse, POCSO Act, Importance of education, drugs and substance abuse among adolescents, Child labour, child marriage and online abuse.

After the meetings parents took an initiative to enquire about their children's education. The meeting helped to understand the problems faced by children and the protection mechanism.

In these meetings we learnt about the importance of education, handling adolescents. We used to scold our children all the time. After the meeting started to think from children's perspective and stopped scolding them unnecessarily. Learnt about the myths about menstrual hygiene. The training on coping with stress guided us to overcome our stress. As housewives we go through lots of issues in our mind if we are not stable then the family will not be stable so it is important to take our mental health and to do what we love.

Training provided with lots of information how after few years of service we fail to use teaching methods because of work pressure and issues at home but this session reminded us on the importance of using unique methods to teach and also learnt to handle children to identify their unique talent.

### 3. ADULT PEER EDUCATORS

150 adult peer educators were trained in child rights and its reporting mechanisms. They are supportive in conducting llanthalir sessions and women group meetings and also helps in identifying the child abuse and child marriage in communities. Two Adult peer educators trained in basic counseling techniques.

### 4. AWARENESS PROGRAMMES

#### 4.1 Raising Awareness on specific Issues

Community level awareness programmes were organised based on the issues identified during interaction with people. During this period the major issues identified were Online addiction, substance abuse and suicidal tendency. Arunodhaya cultural team prepared street play and puppet show on the above issues and conducted 25 awareness programmes in the communities.

## 5. YOUTH FORUM- ARUNODHAYA PUDHUMAI ILINGAR IYAKKAM (APII)

Arunodhaya Pudhumai Ilaingal Iyakkam (APII) is a platform for youth in the age group 18-25years. Members of Confederation of Arunodhaya Children Sangam who complete 18 years become members of APII. Youth are guided in their higher education and job placement. They volunteer their services in Children sangam, education activities and in Arunodhaya's interventions. Training of Trainers (ToT) was organised for youth on preventing substance abuse and online addiction. 50 youth were trained and they created awareness among other youth in their community. Youth participated in the Chennai run marathon to create awareness on cancer.



## 6. COMMUNITY CHILD RIGHTS MONITORING COMMITTEE (CCRMC)

Community Child Rights Monitoring Committee (CCRMC) monitors child rights status in their area and initiate action to prevent and protect children. CCRMCs are active in ten areas. Meetings were held once in three months. CCRMC members interacted with MLAs,MCs. presenting the problems.. They support in the activities of children sangam and youthforum.
